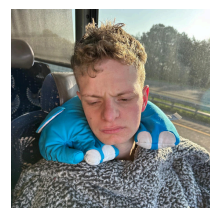
Sunday morning, we gave a program in Blackville and stayed for church. Then, travelled all afternoon to get to our fourth and final destination, Abbeville, SC.
